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Materiality visual map Issue Paper

Background

- In previous meetings the SRB suggested to explore a visual map of the ESRS contents, as a way to disclose the items that are omitted as not material, in the context of the ongoing discussion on how to revise the general approach to materiality in ESRS ('light explicit approach').
- At the same time, always in the context of that ongoing discussion, it emerged that the same visual map (or matrix or content index) could be used as a tool to support the completeness of the materiality assessment performed by the undertakings in case the rebuttable presumption is replaced by a system whereby the content of sector agnostic ESRS is entirely (or partially) subject to materiality assessment.
- 3 At this stage no decision has been taken on the approach to materiality that will be retained in the standards.
- 4 EFRAG SR TEG discussed the format of a visual map on the 6 September 2022 but did not discuss the content of the alternative maps presented.

Objective of this session

5 EFRAG SR TEG members will discuss the content of the visual map, to be used both as a content index (including to mark the items omitted as not material) and as a tool to support the completeness of the materiality assessment.

Visual presentation

- Below, we present two structures of a possible visual presentation to implement the light explicit approach.
- They refer to the content of the EDs, so they will need to be adjusted following the changes to the ESRS EDs that the SRT/SRB are currently discussing. The contents of approach B reflect a careful reading of the EDs (including AGs) and all the aspects in approach B are mentioned in the EDs.
- The underlying assumption is that either list would function as both a context index and as a tool to support the materiality assessment.
- The benefit of approach A is that it is on a higher level and more concise, however, Approach B allows undertakings to be more specific about the aspects to consider in the materiality assessment.


